Overview

Do you know that your body produces electricity? Your brain sends electrical impulses from one nerve to tell your muscles to move, or help you hear and see. A single electrical impulse sends a small light bulb

Scientists don't discover electricity in the body until a few hundred years ago. As late as the 1600s, Benjamin Franklin conducted his famous kite experiments that proved lightning is a form of electricity. People understood power existed all around and even inside them, but they still had no clear way to control it.

People know electricity existed all around and even inside them, but they had no idea how to control it.

All that changed in 1807 with the invention of the telegraph. This was the first machine to connect information to any distance from the earth over long distances. Many electrical inventions followed, including Thomas Edison's light bulb, which brought electricity into people's daily lives for the first time.

Today it would be hard to imagine a world without electricity. Computers, cell phones, lights, microwaves, and plays are almost any machine you can think of depend on electric power. But there is a downside to creating electricity. Power plants pollute air, create acid rain, and streams and water health problems for the future.

Graphic Designers

Graphic designers arrange type and other elements to change images in text or to create a unique look for books, catalogs, posters, CD covers, and other designs. The needs demand more than artistic skill, though. It can help to have a solid grasp of anatomy, as well as a consideration for colors and images that appeal to the public. Graphic designers also work on the Web, though, but on the Webwork requires some specialized knowledge and skills; it is covered in [Web Designer](#).

Education

You can start your career early in graphic design, but first, arts, or the liberal arts if you'd like to become a graphic designer. Although there are two-year programs in graphic design, graduates of these programs usually find work as design assistants, not designers. The [National Association of Schools of Art and Design](#) accredits programs in graphic design.

You have the option of attending a fine-arts college, where you'll receive a very high level of education in art. At these schools, you can major in graphic design and the school will help you build your portfolio and find internships.

Your other option is to pursue a Bachelor's Degree and major in Art, Fine Arts, or Visual Arts (with a focus on marketing) or Communication (with a focus on graphic design or advertising). Although you'll have to work a little harder and more independently, if you are serious about your field, you'll build a portfolio and gain work experience opportunities, you can get the background you'll need. You can read more about both options in [Art Teacher's Degrees](#).

In addition to a range of technical knowledge and a familiarity with the basic principles of design, you'll also need a firm understanding of image manipulation, communication theory, and the history of typography. You should also know computer programs such as QuarkXPress, Adobe Photoshop, Adobe Illustrator, and Flash.
